Congratulations, We Are Engaged!

Parent engagement in your child's school can significantly impact their academic growth and overall educational experience. Students whose parents stay involved in school have better attendance and behavior, get better grades, demonstrate better social skills, and adapt to school. Parental involvement also more securely sets these students up to develop a lifelong love of

learning, which researchers say is critical to long-term success. Research consistently shows substantial benefits when parents are actively engaged in their child's education. Here are some ways parental involvement positively impacts their child's educational experience:

Attendance: When a child's parent is actively involved in their child's school, they know the importance of a child being in class every day and are focused on that child being



in class every day; national studies show that a middle schooler who misses two or fewer days each year has a 93% chance of starting high school on track to graduate versus 66% for a child who misses ten or more days. When parents value education and show up for school meetings and events, it sends a clear message to the child about the importance of education.

Communication: When parents are actively involved in their child's school, they tend to have better relationships with the teachers, staff, and administration. The open line of communication allows teachers and parents to effectively communicate with each other about the student's progress before issues become too overwhelming.

Community Building: Parent engagement often extends beyond individual students. It can help build a sense of community within the school, fostering a supportive and collaborative environment that believes all students. Students excel to unimaged heights because their school and home community support them.

Support at Home: Engaged parents can create a conducive learning environment at home because parents understand the goals of the school and teacher. Support at home is not buying the most expensive learning devices but making sure your students have a good night's sleep and are ready for a new day of learning. These practices encourage a love for learning supported by family, community, and school.

Behavioral Improvements: Parents who are heavily engaged in their students' schools often have students who do not have issues following the school's rules. Knowing that parents are involved can encourage children to behave better and follow school rules.

Social and Emotional Development: We must remember that parent engagement is not just about academics. It can also support a child's social and emotional development. Engaged parents can help their children navigate social challenges and build resilience. It's essential that parent

engagement can take various forms and should be flexible to accommodate the needs and preferences of both parents and schools. Not all parents can be equally involved due to work or other commitments, and schools should strive to create a welcoming and inclusive environment for all parents. Schools must understand that they must provide resources and support to help parents become more engaged in their child's education.

McKinney-Vento Education for Homeless Children and Youth Program

The McKinney-Vento Education for Homeless Children and Youth program is designed to address the problems that homeless children and youth have faced in enrolling, attending, and succeeding in school.

The McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act legislation describes a homeless student as one who "lacks a fixed, regular and adequate residence." If a family lives in any of the following situations:

- Sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason (example: evicted from home, etc.).
- ♦ In a motel, hotel, campground or similar setting due to lack of adequate alternative accommodations.
- In an emergency or transitional shelter.
- ♦ Have a primary nighttime residence that is not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for humans.
- In a car, park, public space, abandoned building, substandard housing, bus or train station, or a similar setting.

In addition, a student who is not in the physical custody of a parent/guardian <u>and</u> is living in one of the situations listed above may be considered an unaccompanied homeless youth.

Eligible children/youth have the right to:

- ◆ Immediate enrollment in school, even if lacking documents normally required for enrollment.
- ◆ Choose between the local school where they are living or the school last attended before becoming homeless, when feasible.
- Receive transportation to school, if requested by the parent or youth.
- ♦ Attend school and participate in school programs with children who are not homeless.
- Receive all the school services available to other students.

What can you do to help children and youth you think may be homeless?

If you suspect that a child or youth does not have adequate housing, please refer the parent or youth to our district homeless liaison, Jill Smith. Involved Parents Help Students Succeed

The school year is flying by, and November is already here! November is Parent Engagement Month. Parent Engagement is a very important component of the U.S. school system. Establishing expectations for how schools and families should collaborate to support learning can make a huge impact on student success.

There are many ways that you, as a parent (or grandparent, or guardian), can help your student to be more successful in school. One important way for you to help your English Learner is to communicate with the teachers. Whether you use email, Remind, or write a note and send it with your child, the teacher will be happy to hear from you! Make sure you also read newsletters and messages from the school or the teacher. Don't be afraid to ask questions. The teachers want to help you and your English Learner. Teachers will work to find interpreters if this is necessary for communication, so please do not hesitate to ask for help. Communication with your child is also very important. Ask questions about school. Ask your English Learner what he or she enjoys learning about at school. Talk about school in a positive way. We want our English Learners to know that school is a wonderful place to learn new things!

Whether your English Learner is in Elementary, Middle, or High School, he or she will benefit from the following suggestions:


- * Getting plenty of rest is important. Make sure your child is getting 8 hours of sleep every night.
- * Eating a good breakfast at home or at school will help your child focus.
- * Attendance and arriving on time are keys to success. Try to schedule appointments after school, and save vacations for school holidays. Make sure your child arrives for school on time because late students are missing instruction.
- * Stay informed about your child's homework. Look at your child's agenda or folder to see what homework has been assigned. Teachers assign homework to help students practice what has been taught in class. Talk about the homework with your child, and be available to help. English Learners in kindergarten and first grade will need the most help. Older students may just need you to remind them about homework. If your child is struggling with homework, contact a teacher for assistance.
- * Read to your child, and encourage your child to read. Ask questions about the story. Ask older students to tell you about the books they are reading. Reading aloud in your native language can actually improve your child's English reading skills, so do not hesitate to do this if possible.
